





#### **Enhancement Grants**

The Foundation provides grants to teachers and students to enhance the educational and extracurricular experience for all Dragons. In our 2024–25 academic year, we committed:

- **\$204,000** for instructional enhancements, academic clubs and teams, student travel and direct student aid (34 grants)
- **\$35,000** for teachers' professional development, including conference participation, graduate studies and educational association memberships (33 grants)

#### **Exploring Identity Through History**

Social studies teacher Christine Anderson received the 2025 Patricia E. Taylor Teaching Award for International Experiences. Her award-funded travel to France explored the intersections of gender, politics and national identity – work that she said underscores "why identity matters and why it needs to be a lens used to study history and politics."

In France, Dr. Anderson studied how women's roles were portrayed across key historical moments, from 19th-century feminism to the World Wars, and examined ongoing debates such as the politics of the veil in the 21st century.

Anderson plans to incorporate these insights into her Gender, Politics and Consumerism in a Global Context class. "This trip allowed me to see history in place," she said. "Now I can help students not only understand events but also see how identity continues to shape the narratives nations tell about themselves."

# the School




"Fund the Dragon" participants sporting their new hats at the March 2025 Night of the Dragon Sneaker Ball
